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Landscape Design

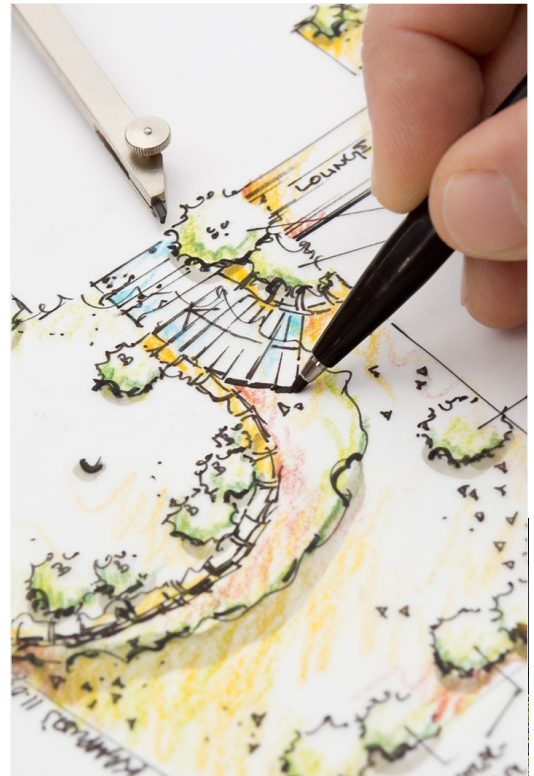
Landscape Design (LD) School dates back to 1958 when it became the second of NGC's Schools. It addresses the principles and elements of LD, development and history of landscape design, process and many other subjects. New curriculum, effective for new school series as of July 1 2019, increases focus on aligning landscaping to the ecosystem and on designing and evaluating your own landscape plan.

Input from North Carolina, where a school began in February 2018 and will conclude in August, illustrates why garden club members and the public should attend. The courses offered students the opportunity to get professional help in designing their own gardens and advised how to talk with civic leaders about ideas that would help enhance public places, such as parks, playgrounds, libraries, and welcome areas.

The professional instructors were experts in their specialized fields and gave students the tools needed to plan, prepare and maintain their home gardens. Students have wanted to come to subsequent courses to learn new and additional information on the next course curriculum so they can build on what they have already learned. It has been a very happy, relaxed and educational time to learn more about the landscape and how to make their homes and surroundings more beautiful.

Gardening School

NGC Gardening Schools were established in May 1977. Four courses were designed to learn the correct way to plant, to prune and marvel at what we have accomplished. We are stewards of the land; we have a responsibility to serve and protect for future generations. This is in keeping with NGC Bylaws Article II, Number 5: "to study and to advance the fine arts of gardening, landscaping, floral design and horticulture."

Courses cover all aspects of growing, from understanding soil structure to pruning techniques, plant identification, etc. Topics include botany, soils, growing annuals, perennials, trees and shrubs, fruits and vegetables, lawns, pests and diseases of plants, plant classification, and selected subjects of local interest. Qualified instructors are relatively easy to recruit as Extension agents, botanical garden directors and university horticulture instructors, both active and retired, are available. Experienced Regional Gardening Accrediting Chairmen are ready to guide the State and Local GS Chairmen through the procedures to set up an accredited Gardening School.

A new position on the Gardening School Committee, Marketing Liaison, is staffed by former GS Accrediting Chair Inger Jones who will suggest ways to keep the Region and State websites/newsletters up to date with School information. All of our Gardening School Committee members will continue to encourage our Consultants to carry out the NGC mission of education for members and for the public. Their activities provide important reasons to join a garden club and to retain membership.

Schools' Handbook

The new Schools' Handbook which includes guidelines and check lists for the school chairmen and committees, interactive/fillable forms and curriculum for the Environmental, Gardening and Landscape Design Schools is available as a free download from the NGC website. School Chairmen and committee members are encouraged to download a copy. Please download the forms and save as a pdf, then open

forms, fill in forms and "save as" in new name: Series, Course, Date, City. All exams are open book.

Handbook Clarification Section 3 Conducting the School Instructor Qualifications, add "Other Qualified Instructors: Extension agents, retired professors, high school teachers, DNR personnel, college interns, landscape architects, environmentalists, nursery personnel."



Environmental School

Wisconsin hosted the first series of Environmental Schools (ES) in 1991. Currently there are 31 states with Environmental Chairmen; most are hosting schools with additional students traveling from neighboring states. Currently, NGC recognizes 992 Accredited or Provisional ES Consultants. (Provisionals are students who have completed two or more schools.) Since its inception, 2237 people have attended one or more of the NGC Environmental Schools.

Upon successful completion of the four Environmental Courses, a person becomes an Environmental Consultant. To maintain this Good Standing, it is necessary to refresh at either a two-day course or a multiple refresher within five years. No additional examinations are required.

The courses include identification of local and global environmental issues, recognizing historic environmental leaders and actions, exploring backyard habitats, sustaining forests, grasslands, deserts and mountains, efficiently producing food, identifying pollutants, recognizing the impact of global warming, protecting the ozone layer, protecting healthy water. Each course includes a field trip with visits to recycling plants, boat trips sampling water, visiting nature centers and more.

Consider attending Environmental Schools, perhaps, traveling to another state. Take the time to explore some of the water, land and air issues across the country and its impact on all.



Flower Show School

"Plants of the World" is now the primary horticulture nomenclature resource for NGC Flower Show Schools and Symposiums (www.plantsoftheworldonline.org.) The previously used www.theplantlist.org is no longer being maintained. "Plants of the World" is the most current, relevant, easiest to use and complete online search engine for plant nomenclature. It includes the most recent nomenclature changes (updated regularly) as well as all the older data from IPNI and from The Plant List. The Plant List was the primary resource for plant names for most of our institutions, government agencies and plant societies.

Rafael Govaerts of Kew Science, (Kew Royal Botanical Gardens) who keeps up the Plants of the World website, point-

ed to his World Checklist for Selected Plants site <http://wcsp.science.kew.org/> to use as a backup when needing to chase back synonyms. For example, when the need rose to verify the now outdated *Sansevieria* species names to convert them to their new *Dracaena* species, the World Checklist was most helpful.

Peter Stevens maintains the Angiosperm Phylogeny Website of Missouri Botanical Garden www.mobot.org/MOBOT/research/APweb/. Peter Stevens and his global committee approve nomenclature changes relying, among other things, on published old records, DNA, chemistry, etc. Proposed nomenclature changes are evaluated by meetings of the committee and on an ongoing basis.

Plant America

With their Plant America Grant, The Sunset Garden Club (SGC) members and friends created a welcoming, beautifying, and pollinator-attracting garden at the prominent front corner of the new Madison Wisconsin Midtown Police Precinct.

In the words of Midtown Precinct Captain Jay Lengfeld, "I'm hoping the community feels that this is their building; this is their police department." As such, the inviting garden space near the precinct's entrance is intended to capture the public's attention and make them feel more at ease. The blue, yellow and white flower color palette will remind onlookers of the women and men in blue who faithfully serve to protect us. The natural setting reflects the Madison Police Department's community-policing philosophy that speaks to the relationships between the police and the people served in order to achieve important goals: prevention of crime, greater degrees of public trust, and enhanced quality of life.

Additionally, conservation efforts to protect the declining population of both monarch butterflies and rusty patched bumblebees will be highlighted in the garden. By registering the garden as a pollinator way station, it will become part of the National Garden Club's initiative to create safe habitats and oases for native species. SGC plans to engage with neighborhood schools to make them aware of this crisis and offer ways for them to help, primarily by participating in the new photography-based volunteer Bumble Bee Brigade monitoring project focused on this garden. The Plant America program allows clubs to apply for community grants to help with community beautification projects, community and/or school gardens, landscaping for Blue Star Memorials or Habitat for Humanity homes, or public horticultural or environmental programs or events.

Club applications are due October 15, 2019 with projects completed by April 2021. Final reports are required.

CONNECTICUT CLUBS BECOME CONSERVATION CHAMPIONS

When Inge Venus was installed as the 44th President of The Federated Garden Clubs of Connecticut, Inc. in 2017, she introduced her theme of Plant Connecticut – Be A Conservation Champion: Conserve Water, Assist Pollinators, Garden Organically. President Inge followed this up by introducing her project for the Conservation Championship Award of encouraging clubs to work with their local government to create either a Xeriscape Garden or a Pollinator-friendly Garden in their communities. Individual garden club members were encouraged to establish a Xeriscape Garden in their yard.

The response was overwhelming! At the 90th FGCCT Annual Meeting in 2019, President Venus presented a gold-framed Conservation Championship Award Certificate to twelve garden clubs and an engraved marble plaque to two individual garden club members. State Project Chair Holly Kocet emphasized that the President's Project has addressed the serious issue of pollinator decline, primarily caused by lack of floral resources and pesticide use. Each participating club's work stands as an example to their community of how we can make positive impacts and effect change. In 2017, NGC introduced Horticulture Specialty Flower Shows. Has your Garden Club presented this new show to its members? My club, Terrebonne Garden Club, staged one in 2018. We live in southernmost Louisiana, not far from the Gulf of Mexico. With our mild winters and abundant rain, horticulture is second nature to most of us. Seven of our members participate in Gardening School and having chaired a series of four courses, the school is advertised at many of our meetings.

As we staged the Horticulture Specialty Show, over thirty members exhibited specimens. Entries numbered one hundred thirty seven in sixty-seven classes! Having seven gardening consultants enhanced the number and quality of entries.

The new Horticulture Specialty Flower Shows provide excellent opportunities for NGC Gardening Consultants to help stage and enter specimens. Their skills are also useful to helping classify horticultural entries in Standard Flower Shows.

Tips & Tricks

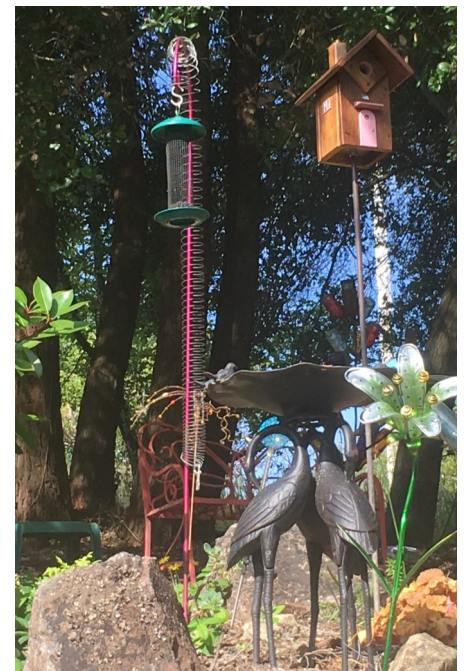

GOLD STAR MARKER IN FRANCE - Nancy Hargroves

- ★ FIRST marker NGC has located outside of United States.
- ★ Donated by Jefferson Parish Garden Clubs, Métairie, LA.
- ★ The marker was placed in Sainte Mère Église, France, the first town liberated in the D-Day invasion.
- ★ Madame Simone Renaud and her husband Alexandre, the mayor, witnessed the liberation of France on June 6, 1944 from a unique viewpoint. Their small town of Sainte Mère Église was the first town liberated in the D-Day invasion.
- ★ Many American soldiers are buried in Sainte Mère Église.
- ★ Madame Renaud spent a lifetime tending to the graves of those American soldiers and corresponding with their loved ones back home.
- ★ She became friend, family and touchstone to those whose lives were forever changed by D-Day.
- ★ This is a memorial gift, which the entire membership of the National Garden Clubs presented to her son, Maurice Renaud and to the town on the 75th anniversary of D-day.

It is fitting for NGC to recognize a woman who planted flowers, took care of graves of the men who died liberating her town and wrote to the families of the fallen. Known now as the Mother of Normandy, she was a remarkable woman, whose devotion to a generation of heroes transcended all boundaries.
