"PROTECT OUR FRIENDS THE POLLINATORS... THEY ARE PLANTS' BEST FRIENDS"

Objectives: (1) To educate school students to create and maintain native gardens on school grounds, emphasizing the importance of pollinators; (2) To help teachers and students alike be "Friends to Pollinators..Plants' Best Friends" by providing food and habitat for pollinators with their choice of plants; (3) To emphasize the use of native, pollinator friendly plants and reduce pesticide use by using organic methods in flower and vegetable gardens; (4) To emphasize plants for all seasons, different colors, shapes and scents to attract the widest variety of pollinators (bees, beetles, moths, butterflies, hummingbirds and even bats); (5) To provide NGC Awards - 1st Place - \$100; 2nd Place - \$50; and 3rd Place - \$25.00.

Scope of Project: May be large or small, portable or stationary, may incorporate educational instruction.

<u>Certificates</u> will be presented to local Garden Clubs, Regions, States, International Affiliates at 2012 and 2013 NGC Convention for completed projects. Participating schools will also be acknowledged, as will clubs that promote the project as a Special Exhibit at any meeting or Standard Flower Show.

Special NGC Project - PROTECTING AQUATIC ECOSYSTEMS Mary Sue Colvin, Chairman

NGC President, Shirley Nicolai, has selected Protecting Aquatic Ecosystems as one of her special projects for 2011 – 2013. Garden club members have a platform and an opportunity to participate in projects that will rescue, recover, revitalize and protect aquatic ecosystems in their community.

Aquatic ecosystems include rivers, lakes, ponds, streams, creeks, springs, marshes, bogs, wetlands, coastal estuaries, floodplains and aquifers. As an organization, National Garden Clubs, Inc. is committed to supporting and undertaking proactive initiatives for the protection, conservation and restoration of the quality of our aquatic ecosystems.

Garden clubs should strongly consider one or more of the following projects for 2011 – 2013:

- Appointment of a Water Protection/Conservation Chairman for the club.
- Inclusion of a brief report from the Water Protection/Conservation Chairman on the agenda for all club meetings.
- Creation and promotion of educational hands-on programs for youth (classrooms, Scouts, 4-H, Junior Garden Clubs).

HELP SAVE OUR POLLINATORS

The US has lost over 50% of our managed honeybee colonies over the last 10 years due to chemical misuse, introduced and invasive plant and animal species, diseases and parasites.

WHAT CAN WE DO to promote and protect pollinators?

- WATCH FOR POLLINATORS: Get connected with nature. Take a walk, experience the landscape and look for pollinators, midday in sunny, planted areas. Install houses for bats and native bees, encouraging them to thrive.
- **CREATE** a pollinator-friendly garden habitat.
- DESIGN your garden so that there is a continuous succession of plants flowering from spring through fall. Check for the species and cultivars best suited to your area and gradually replace lawns with flower beds.
- PLANT NATIVE SPECIES that will thrive in your region, using plants that provide nectar for insects and hummingbirds and also food for larvae, such as milkweed for monarchs.
- SUPPLY water for all wildlife.
- **REDUCE YOUR IMPACT:** Reduce or eliminate your pesticide use, increase green spaces and minimize urbanization. Pollution and climate change affect pollinators, just as they affect people.
- SPREAD THE WORD: Pollinators have enabled our diverse variety
 of plants to prosper and grow, creating an abundance of food for
 our hungry world, for thousands of years. Now, THEY need OUR
 help. Please help them by creating a pollinator-friendly environment,
 through conservation and education, ultimately establishing a global
 awareness of our fragile planet. Teach our children the importance
 of pollinators with fun facts, such as a tiny fly ("a midge") no bigger
 than a pinhead is responsible for the world's supply of chocolate!

- The sponsoring of seminars, workshops and/or community education events to foster awareness and procedures for protecting aquatic ecosystems in the area.
- Adoption of an aquatic ecosystem as a club project.

The article Bulb Lasagne was submitted by Container Gardens committee member, Mary Moreno of New Mexico. Read! Enjoy! Learn!

Betsy Steele, Coordinator Plantings for Public and Special Places; betsysteele@truvista.net Bulb Lasagne ENJOY 3 months of blooms from layers of bulbs.

Ingredients: 10 daffodil bulbs; 7 tulip bulbs; 3 hyacinth bulbs; 5 crocus bulbs; 2 (6-packs) pansies; 16" x 16" flower pot; 1 ½ cubic-foot bag GARDEN soil; bulb food (1 tablespoon at a time)

Directions:

- Start with a four-inch layer of soil in a minimum of 16"(deep) pot sprinkled with 1 tablespoon of bulb food, and plant your tulip bulbs in the center, placing them firmly into the soil.
- Add additional three to four inches of soil, bulb food and a layer of daffodil bulbs that bloom in mid-spring. Arrange daffodil bulbs past the center of the pot, where you have already placed the tulip bulbs.
- Add additional three to four inches of soil, bulb food and a layer of hyacinth bulbs and crocus bulbs, two inches from the edges of the pot.
- 4. Add the final four inches of soil. DO NOT add bulb food to this layer.
- Top off your lasagne with winter pansies, already in bloom. They will survive the winter climate and will wilt, to remind you to water the pot. ###
- Water with approximately four gallons of water after planting. Whenever pansies are wilted, water with approximately two gallons of water. Do not add plant food to your water or pot before February.

CHILL ALL WINTER: Leave the pot outside to take advantage of the winter's chill.

In colder climates you need to put your lasagne container in a cold cellar or garage rather than outside. If you do try to leave it outside, mulch it heavily with lots of leaves and branches. When the temperatures start to rise, you could try pansies and cover them if temperatures go way below freezing. Water the container during the winter. This recipe comes to us from Suzy Andrego, NMGC, Inc.

NGC ENVIRONMENTAL CONCERNS - LEGISLATION Marion Hilliard, Chairman

YOU ARE INVITED. Every state, every garden club, every NGC Environmental Consultants Council and every individual is welcome to add their name and personal efforts to "THE POWER OF WATER" CAMPAIGN introduced to the NGC President Shirley Nicolai and members of the NGC "Protecting Aquatic Ecosystems" committee during the NGC Fall Board Meeting in St. Louis (by the NGC Legislation Committee).

The National Clean Water Network (CWN) is planning this major water campaign to commemorate the 40th anniversary of the Clean Water Act -- one of our nation's landmark environmental laws. The goal of the 1972 Clean Water Act, to restore and maintain the chemical, physical and biological integrity of our nation's waters, cannot be met unless all waters are safeguarded against pollution.

The **Power of Water** campaign will be an opportune time to remind decision makers on local, state and national levels that clean water is essential not just for public health and the environment, but essential for a strong sustainable economy.

The Call to Action states "Water, our most precious and valuable resource, defines life. Unlike other natural resources, such as oil or natural gas, there is no substitute for water. Clean water, just like clean air, is essential for our health." Signing the pledge is simply agreeing that you, or a group, pledges to work collectively to identify solutions and tools to address and tackle threats to our national water resources. You also are agreeing to make use of every opportunity to actively educate government officials, garden club members, neighbors and fellow citizens about threats to our fresh water resources.

Participating in "The Power of Water" campaign is an opportunity -- another way of carrying out our President Nicolai's special project "Protecting Aquatic Ecosystems." <u>Signing the Call to Action</u> <u>Statement couldn't be easier</u>. NGC SCHOOLS NEWS - Greg Pokorski, ES, GS and LD Schools Coordinator

Your NGC Schools Committees met in individual and joint meetings for many hours at the September NGC Fall Board Meeting in St. Louis. Each of these schools developed independently and at different times (Landscape Design (LD) in the 1950s, Gardening Study (GS) in the 1970s and Environmental Studies (ES) in the 1990s). Changes have been made in the programs over the last ten years to make them more consistent (e.g. fees and time to refresh). We continue to work toward identifying areas where additional consistencies may be achieved in order to make the schools more user-friendly to our students and consultants.

Actions taken in St. Louis to be ratified:

- The designation Environmental Intern for students who have successfully completed two courses of ES School will be changed to Provisional Consultant, which is the existing designation for students who have successfully completed two courses of the LD and GS Schools.
- 2. In order to be an NGC Consultant, a student who has successfully completed all four courses of an NGC school must be a member of an NGC-affiliated garden club, and may receive Consultant status by joining an NGC-affiliated garden club within one year (for all three schools) after completion of the school. This changes the time permitted to join a member garden club from the current 6 months for GS and five years for LD and for the first time establishes this policy for ES so that all three schools deal with this provision in the same manner.
- 3. The \$5 NGC fee currently required on ES Form #5-07 to apply for Environmental Consultant Accreditation is eliminated because there is no similar requirement for LD and GS. There is no change to the requirement that all students who test in each school and all Consultants who refresh in each school pay a \$5 NGC fee.
- 4. Proof of subscription (submission of label or NGC Life Member number or proof of purchase) to The National Gardener may be submitted any time a student tests in each of these schools, and <u>must</u> <u>be submitted</u> (at the time of the school or event) when a student is testing in her/his fourth course of each of these schools (and therefore applying for Consultant status) and when a Consultant attends any of these educational programs for refresher credit.

All local, state, and regional Schools Chairmen should note these policies. State Presidents and NGC Schools Committee members, please share this information with your state ES, GS and LD Chairmen.

GRANTS/DEVELOPMENT/GIFTS Pat Westgard, Chairman

Planned Giving Program

The Grants/Development/Gifts Committee is in the process of establishing details for a Planned Giving Program to provide funding for valued NGC programs with gifts from the membership through financial planning. The concept for implementation was approved during the 2007-2009 administration.

The following options will be available:

A) Wills and Estates

- 1. Direct bequests to NGC of cash and/or property
- 2. Charitable Remainder Trusts
- 3. If properly executed there may be savings in Estate Taxes (federal & state), Income Taxes, Capital Gains Tax and Gift Taxes. Check with your Professional advisor.
- B) Life Insurance Proceeds
 - 1. Designate a percent of a present policy to NGC via a beneficiary designation form.
 - 2. Budget a monthly payment to purchase a product of greater value upon death. Most policies typically cost less than \$.30 per dollar of proceeds. (Affordable & helps set the amount of gift.)
 - 3. If properly planned may qualify for Income Tax and Estate Tax savings. (ie. All or part of premiums may be Income tax deductible based on current tax laws.)
- C) Donations of stocks and other assets
 - 1. If one sells them, one must pay capital gains. If gifting stock, one receives full benefit of the gift and avoids capital gains.
 - 2. Method of transferring assets out of Estate. Check with your professional.
- D) Planned Giving Program by individuals
 - 1. May establish a planned giving program to make on-going gifts on a monthly, semi-annual, or annual basis.
 - 2. Individual establishes parameters for amount, time frame and 'fund of interest'.
 - 3. NGC provides an annual report of donation for tax reports.

PACIFIC REGION DEBBIE HINCHEY

Project Mission Blue is a partnership between California Garden Clubs. Inc. and Golden Gate National Parks Conservancy to increase the lupine diversity by propagating and planting California native pathogenresistant summer lupine and varied lupine. It is the hope to stabilize the Mission Blue Butterfly community during years of fungal outbreak and allow these populations to increase over the long term. CGCI agrees to donate at least \$3,000 for each of the next five years. To raise the tax-deductible funds a pin is given for each \$100 donation. They have fulfilled the first \$3,000 in less than three months after CGCI President Julie West took office and established the project. They are coordinating with high school horticulture classes to germinate the lupine seeds and prepare plants for transplanting. This project was already a priority and glossy brochures produced by the time Julie (a long time butterfly conservationist) joined the project to add needed funds, gardening expertise, and coordination with personally known youth horticulture programs.
