From the Landscape Design School Chairman

Greetings,

"The aim of the Landscape Design Study Program since its inception has been to educate our members in the application of sound principles of design to landscaping.

The Landscape Design Study Courses...have been a successful force in promoting good landscape practices for many years and...these courses will be strengthened and will continue to meet the needs of garden club members desiring to gain personal and practical knowledge of landscape design." - Barbara Barnette, President of National Council of State Garden Clubs, Inc. (now National Garden Clubs, Inc), introducing *Stewards of the Land* (1999).

26 years later (yes, it's been that long ago!) the aims of NGC's Landscape Design School have remained the same. However, there have been several changes along the way, the most recent follow: *Stewards of the Land* is now a recommended, not required text. Forms we now use differ from those used prior (refillable and ideally reusable!) and curriculum has been revised. Courses 3 and 4 now provide students and consultants with practical information to develop personal landscape design plans. All courses now follow this revised curriculum. And now the committee structure is similar to that for Environmental and Gardening Schools.

Change is good. To keep advancing, schools need input from students and consultants as well as local/state school organizers/chairmen. Please help evaluate the changes by giving us any feedback you have regarding your experiences. Are there any suggestions you have?

We are nearing the end of this term and there are many thanks for the people who have served as NGC Landscape Design School Accrediting Chairmen. All their efforts, time and work processing all that's necessary to get a school started and accredited after the school has been completed is much appreciated. NEWS FROM LANDSCAPE DESIGN CONSULTANTS FROM ACROSS THE COUNTRY

California

You do not need to be the state garden club, or even a district, to sponsor and conduct NGC Schools. My club, Southern California Garden Club (based in Los Angeles' San Fernando Valley), just completed a successful Landscape Design School. This is the fifth school we have offered. We've conducted three Gardening Schools, a Flower Show School, and two Tri-Refreshers, and are now planning another Gardening School to begin next summer. We have 160 members now. We were smaller when we conducted previous schools.

All four courses were completed within a seven-week period. We could use the venue (a church with a school on the premises) only during the summer when school was not in session. The students liked the fast track, but that did present some challenges for the chairmen involved. A student commented, "We learned and ate and learned again and it was wonderful!"

Most of the six instructors involved were new to NGC Schools but had favorable impressions. Ron Ruiz said he enjoyed meeting all the students and the experience and hopes to do it again. All indicated willingness to teach again. Of the 50 individuals who attended one or more courses, all who took the exams passed and we have 23 new Landscape Design Consultants who completed all four courses. Refreshing consultants travelled as far as 626 miles from the north and 145 miles from the south (the complete length of California). Ten students joined the club. This is a benefit of the in-classroom school as it was the "special event" nature of the school, the socialization, camaraderie, networking and breakfasts and special lunches (hot dog cookout, baked potato bar, pizza days etc.) that was instrumental in making students want to be part of our club.

I served as proctor and was impressed with the diligence of the students and their serious engagement in creating their own landscaping plan in Course 3 and in the evaluations of landscape designs in Course 4. The

church grounds of our school venue were the subject of the public landscape evaluation, and we travelled to the nearby home of our club president to do the residential evaluation. Enjoyable supplemental subjects included Trees, Fire-safe Landscaping and Art in the Landscape.

Kudos to Alexis Slafer, a landscape architect and former NGC LD Schools Accrediting Chairman, who is our California LDS Chairman and a member of our club (among several). She served as Local Chairman and with the help of a number of club members *designed* a memorable and educational event.

I've been a landscape architect for over 40 years and have taught various classes, but this was my first time with several subjects in the landscape design school. The outline for the classes is loose enough to allow for lots of flexibility. I learned so much in creating the material for the classes. I think that my delight in having new thoughts about landscape design translated to interest from my students. The experience has taught me that there is always more to learn, and teaching others is an inspiration that keeps me fresh in a most wonderful profession.

The infrastructure has also been upgraded to include a large building called The Grove which houses a much larger and brighter library, state-of-the art classrooms, and many departments' offices. The cafeteria is now an enlarged café, and a new restaurant has been built under the East Conservatory which overlooks the Main Fountain Area. You'll want to make your required timed reservations well in advance. I highly recommend visiting Longwood Gardens on a Friday, Saturday or Sunday evening so that you can take in the most dazzling Illuminated Fountain show, set to music, that you will ever see. The Illuminated show is free with admission. In planning a trip, keep in mind that the Illuminated Fountain Show begins at 9:15 p.m. May through August, and begins at 8:15 pm in September and October.

Treat yourself to a family vacation, a Garden Club Road Trip, or a District-wide bus tour. With careful planning, you could also use the Passport to plan one of the NGC Schools or design a Tri-Refresher. The possibilities are endless!

Longwood Gardens' 2025 Community Read selection takes you on one woman's journey to create a beautiful indoor garden at her home as a place of learning and sanctuary after an inspiring visit to a public garden conservatory. What a perfect complement to our own journey in creating Longwood Reimagined/A New Garden Experience ... which includes a stunning new conservatory, the preservation of a historic indoor garden by acclaimed Brazilian landscape architect Roberto Burle Marx, and other memorable experiences. NGC Schools Increase Membership by Conducting NGC Schools

On February 3, NGC's Membership Mondays presentation was about tools and resources for increasing club membership. I had the opportunity to be one of the presenters, probably based on the many schools chairmanships I have had over the years and my long-term promotion of our schools as one of NGC's best benefits.

Conducting schools brings attention and recognition to the sponsoring organization. Clubs and districts can directly sponsor and conduct schools, focusing attention on garden club at the local level. When a club conducts a school, it can offer a discount in school fees to its members, a nice benefit for its members that also may encourage others to join the club to obtain the discount. Those seeking to become NGC Consultants must belong to a member garden club – another reason for those students who don't already belong to a garden club to become members.

Those states where schools are conducted directly be the state garden club might want to consider conducting schools at the club and district level.

Conducting a school gives the sponsoring organization new connections: to the public (prospective students); to instructors; to those associated with the school venue. At the school you might have displays about the projects, activities and meetings of your club. Even those students who do not join your club or become Consultants can become ambassadors of good will once they learn something about your organization and its good works. All outreach and exposure increases the visibility of your organization and has the potential of attracting new members.
