While home caring for their children, Rebekah and Andy, volunteerism became an important way to connect with others and give back to organizations she cared about. As her children got older, she taught in the Fayette County, WV Public Schools and later worked for Fayette County, WV Public Library. Brenda is a gammy to seven perfect grandsons.

Although the daughter of an agriculture engineer and married to a forester, Brenda's love for all things outdoors began when she first joined a garden club in 1994. Never did she dream, by accepting an invitation to join a garden club, she would become a club president, a district director, the West Virginia Garden Club President and now the National Garden Clubs President.

Brenda has a special passion for unusual and native plants. The Moore's have a certified West Virginia Wild Yard, a National Wildlife Federation Certified Yard, and a Certified Monarch Waystation. Being a good steward of our Earth is very important to her. As a four-star member, becoming a five-star member is one of her goals. The four NGC Youth books were authored or co-authored by her.

She looks forward to meeting, communicating with, and working with National Garden Clubs' members and potential members to make our organization an even better one.

Acceptance Speech

May 4, 2023 White Sulphur Springs, West Virginia



I am proud to represent NGC as a West Virginian. West Virginians are an independent and self-sufficient people who enjoy a slower pace of life and defend our faith, family and friends. A former state auditor, Glen Gainer, said: "West Virginians are as rugged as our mountains, as generous as our abundant wildlife and are as complex as our network of clean free flowing rivers."

My theme for the next two years is "Go Green - Plant America." It appears to be a simple theme, but it is multifaceted. When I look at Google Earth, I am proud to live in a forested state that appears all green. Many places in our state are remote but I would not trade the natural beauty of our green spaces for anything. Plants are essential for survival and give us a sense of well-being. That is the subject of National Garden Clubs' latest, and my last youth book entitled "My Green is Gone." We will continue to promote participation in our youth projects and working with youth. This includes a new printable activity book entitled "Do Something Green." Children are our future garden club members and stewards of our Earth.

"Go Green" promotes environmental responsibility. To quote Kermit the Frog: "It's not easy bein' Green." It is not always easy being a good steward of our planet – it oftentimes means making hard choices. We need to ask ourselves: do we always have to have the biggest, the newest and the best and dispose of the old, yet still usable items? Thomas S. Monson states: "May we ever choose the harder right instead of the easier wrong." Sometimes that harder choice is purchasing more costly native plants compared to the plants found in box stores. It could mean not having the latest electronics. It might mean using a pitcher of water instead of using plastic water bottles at our meetings. It can mean not having America's idea of perfect lawns and instead choosing to protect pollinators and animal habitats. Sometimes it means doing away with unnecessary paperwork at our garden club meetings. Environmental Stewardship is part of who I am and thus will be a major emphasis of this administration.

A green light means "GO." So, we will have Go Green - Plant America initiatives. I will continue to support and encourage applications to Plant America Community Grants. A new initiative will be Plant America, Feed America, encouraging planting gardens and sharing the bounty to feed those with food insecurities. Another will be Plant America – Landscape for Wildlife, and Plant America – Plant for Pollinators. This will involve National Garden Clubs' promotion, certification and tracking members' pollinator and wildlife habitats. Once certified, members will have the option of purchasing a sign for their yard.

Acceptance Speech, Cont'd

May 4, 2023 White Sulphur Springs, West Virginia



I encourage members to "Go" for it whether it is deciding to attend NGC schools, deciding to serve in their club, on their state or the NGC board of directors, or making changes to long held traditions to make all garden clubs more appealing to all individuals. Set goals for yourselves, for your clubs, for your state, as I have set goals for NGC and myself. One of my personal goals is to become a five-star member. I am now one symposium away from that goal. I believe in our schools and completing all four schools has shaped how I view our natural world.

Another lyric in Kermit's song states: "But green's the color of Spring. And green can be cool and friendly-like." We need to be friendly-like as we go green. We need to be encouragers and not be critical, especially of our leaders. We are all volunteers. We are all going to make mistakes.

During this administration I don't want us to be recognized for our titles, but by our works. I hope we can set an example of what it means to "Go Green."

Fall Board Meeting - President's Report September 2023

Five months into my presidency, I am often reminded of the benefits of belonging to a garden club. It's so important to share experiences, even difficult ones, with other members. I've been able to visit some of the best and most beautiful areas of our country in between visiting state garden clubs on our own dime. I've also seen and felt the effects of climate change. We were the only ones there wearing shorts. We explored Olympia, Washington. We got to visit Mt. Ranier National Park and had hoped to visit Mt. St. Helens, but a road collapse prevented that. Board Meeting - President's Report Convention 2024 Denver, Colorado

Since June, I have enjoyed visiting the following states to attend their region meetings: Little Rock, Arkansas; Gatlinburg, TN; Des Moines, IA; Plymouth, MA and Corning, NY. I've also visited State conventions in Jacksonville, FL, Atlanta, GA and Little Rock, AR. I usually speak on leadership at region meetings, and I present a power point "50 shades of Green" at state meetings, explaining what NGC offers its members. I presented this program by Zoom at Minnesota's state convention. Visiting with our membership is my favorite thing to do.

It keeps me in touch with what is going on within regions, states and members. National Garden Clubs has faced many challenges this administration. We are in the midst of transitioning. Understanding transitioning and the need to transition is important. Transitions mark milestones, offer fresh starts and offer new opportunities to reflect and re-calibrate. Transitions also have a way of revealing character and competency in those called to lead in this new season.

National Garden Clubs is always evaluating spending. We want to be good stewards of our finances. One such change will include less mailings which will include going from printed certificates to emailing printable certificates. We have to learn to plan and conduct conventions so they don't continue to suffer from financial loss for NGC. They also need to be affordable for those attending. Our fall board meeting will be a hybrid meeting, with little financial commitment from NGC. I don't know how this will work, but we have to try.

National Garden Clubs hopes to rewrite our standing rules and bylaws in the next administration. Some things are lacking in our governing documents, some on the other hand are unnecessary. We've been patching these documents for years and it's time to look at them in their entirety and catch up with the times. You will find many changes to the Flower Show Handbook to simplify the process of becoming a Flower Show Judge. Of course this happened once I reached the status of being a master FSS judge. So many of these changes are dependent on input from our members. Each of you is so important to the future of National Garden Clubs. Thank you for serving and keep looking ahead.

When I was interviewed by the Nominating Committee and asked why I would want to become third Vice President, I responded by saying that NGC has given me so much that I wanted to give back to the organization.

I served NGC the best I could. There seemed to be a lot thrown at me this administration. The Bible states in James 1:3 that testing produces patience. I should have lots of patience. I've dealt with problems and issues head on. I've tried my best to protect NGC staff, NGC and my BOD in dealing with issues. Because of these many issues, I've used the option to decline serving as PH&E director simply to give myself a needed break. Ron and I moved to Pittsburgh and will use the time to settle in and get involved in community activities. I've already spoken to four local clubs and joined Shaler Garden Club. I've tried my best to give back and in turn, I've received. I've received wonderful friendships that will last a lifetime. I've received some wonderful and unique gifts — which started with an orchid named after me from my own state, WV. I've received state life memberships; a tree named for me in Grenada, MS along with a 3 lb. ball of MSU Eden cheese; a day named for me in LeCounte, LA, the pie capital of LA — April 7; trees planted in my name in DE where we walked the shoreline to see horseshoe crab line the shore. Alva Hutchinson later sent me a book about these unique creatures; Maryland probably gave me the most unique gift — a set of coasters with sayings such as "I did a push up today. Well, actually I fell down. But I had to use my arms to get back up so...you know, close enough." I've received many donations to NGC projects in my honor. And did I mention friendships? Bonding and enjoying each other is what NGC is about. NGC helped me to fulfill my desire to visit all 50 states. Note I didn't visit all 50 these past two years. When close, we visited our National Parks. Ron and I wore shorts to visit Crater Lake which had 3 feet of snow. We also visited Glacier National Park a day after Road to the Sun opened. We have had positive responses to the Presidential Projects — Plant America, Feed America; Plant America — Plant for Pollinators; Plant America — Landscape for Wildlife. These projects reflect my heart. Finally, thank you for your patience and for allowing me to serve. It's an experience I'll never forget.


