About National Garden Clubs, Inc.

National Garden Clubs, Inc. (NGC) is a nonprofit 501(c)(3) organization headquartered in St. Louis, Missouri, USA adjacent to the Missouri Botanical Gardens. NGC's first garden club meeting took place in Athens, GA in 1891 and as of today, there are over 138,000 members and growing. The organization now coordinates the interests and activities of its 5,000 member clubs and their affiliated youth clubs in 50 states as well as the National Capitol Area. There are also numerous US affiliated organizations as well as nearly 330 internationally affiliated organizations with locations ranging around the globe.

Plant America

The **PLANT AMERICA** initiative began in 2017 under the leadership of former NGC President Nancy Hargroves and has been continued by each subsequent president. It is now celebrated every April, coordinating with Arbor Day and Earth Day. The grants are readily available to member clubs, supporting their diverse projects which have a profound impact on public spaces, including:

- **Enhancing** public areas with beautiful landscapes
- **Honoring** veterans through Blue Star landscaping projects
- **Educating** both children and adults about the joys of gardening
- **Fostering** local pride through city and county projects
- **Improving** community well-being and environmental health

The **PLANT AMERICA Community Project Grants*** are designed to enhance and beautify public areas and community gardens. These grants, available to member clubs and affiliated youth clubs of the **National Garden Clubs, Inc. (NGC)**, aim to educate both adults and children about the joys of gardening, while fostering a sense of pride within the community.

Grants can be utilized for a variety of purposes including physical landscaping, environmental projects, or horticultural and educational opportunities for the community. Since their inception in 2017, over 250 grants have been awarded to NGC member clubs, amounting to more than \$225,000. Each grant can provide up to \$2,000 for eligible projects.

Youth Club Insurance Coverage

NGC does not provide specific liability insurance for youth clubs.

- If liability insurance is needed for events or activities, the Youth Club President should first check with their State Garden Club to determine if coverage is available.
- If no coverage is provided through the state, the club may consider obtaining an Activities & Social Clubs Policy or similar coverage through a private insurance provider.

WHY form an NGC Youth Club?

When youth groups choose to become affiliated with NGC, there are myriad benefits provided:

Fostering Wonder: Encourages a sense of wonder about the natural world and educates youth on making wise choices for conserving and protecting our planet.

Wide Range of Programs: Offers activities, projects, programs, scholarships, and contests to promote horticulture.

Partnerships: Working in tandem with nationally recognized organizations such as the U.S. Forest Service, international affiliates and programs offered by NGC's local, state and regional garden clubs.

Nature Arts Programs: Provides nature-related arts programs that inspire creativity through observing life cycles.

STEAM Education: Combines nutrition with gardening using STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts, Mathematics) learning.

5 Rs: Encouraging responsible consumer behavior by introducing the 5 Rs: Reduce, Reuse, Recycle, Repurpose & Refill.

Green Careers: Raises awareness of future career opportunities in fields like solar farming, aquaculture, recycling, landscaping, and water and turf management.

WHO can form an NGC Youth Club?

In order to form an **NGC-affiliated Youth Garden Club**, it is required to have an **NGC Sponsoring Club**, which can be any garden club affiliated with NGC.

These are the four types of **NGC-affiliated Youth Garden Clubs**:

TYPE 1: Formed by a Sponsoring Club

Any **NGC-affiliated Garden Club** may become a Sponsoring Club by **forming it's own NGC-affiliated Youth Garden Club**. For example, youth may be invited from the club members' families, friends and neighbors.

TYPE 2: Formed with a School Group

The Sponsoring Club may connect with a **school group** in order to form an **NGC-affiliated Youth Garden Club**.

A school group may be any group of students (class, grade level, or mixed grade) and can meet anytime (before, during, or after school, in the evenings, or on weekends.)

TIP: *When reaching out to a school principal, teacher, or staff member to see if their school is interested, it's essential to educate them on the benefits of youth gardening.*

WHO can form an NGC Youth Club?

TYPE 3: Formed with a Youth Organization

The Sponsoring Club may connect with an **existing youth organization** in order to establish an **NGC-affiliated Youth Garden Club**.

Examples include:

- National 4-H Council
- Scouting America
- Girl Scouts of the USA
- Camp Fire
- Future Farmers of America
- Junior Master Gardener
- Latino Outdoors



TYPE 4: Formed with a Community Youth Group

A Sponsoring Club may connect with any existing adult-led, **community-based youth groups**, to form an **NGC-affiliated Youth Garden Club**.

Examples include:

- Home-school Groups
- Daycare Centers
- After-school Programs
- Boys & Girls Clubs of America
- Neighborhood Youth Associations
- Science and Ecology Youth Clubs
- Church Youth Groups

HOW to form an NGC Youth Club.

When receiving authorization from a sponsoring organization, the youth club leader needs to discuss age/grade level, club size, member selection, and number of yearly meetings to meet basic requirements of an **NGC-Affiliated Youth Garden Club**. The program content is often geared to the appropriate grade-level science curriculum.

A youth garden club can meet before, during, or after school or evenings and weekends.

It is important to complete the paperwork to register each **NGC-Affiliated Youth Garden Club** yearly at the state level. Regional and national registration is automatic once the state registration forms are submitted.

The sponsoring club may pay the nominal state registration fee, if applicable. Both the sponsoring club and it's youth club should strive to maintain close ties the first year and consistent ties throughout later years with visits, emails, and phone calls.

Participation in the nationally sponsored youth contests and awards is optional, and many youth clubs wait until becoming fully operational before submitting entries. Some states have award ceremonies for state contest or award winners at their state conventions; other states, at alternate sites at a different time.

State Youth Club REGISTRATION

REGISTERING AN NGC-AFFILIATED YOUTH CLUB

At present, **Youth Club** registration requirements vary by state. Some **State Garden Clubs** ask Youth Clubs to register at the state level, while others do not. Please contact your state club for their current policies and guidelines.

In the future, **NGC** anticipates that states may be asked to use a standard **Youth Club Roster Form** to collect the numbers of clubs and members nationwide.

Similar to a census, this data would help **NGC** strengthen planning, expand support for youth initiatives, and improve opportunities to secure funding.

A sample Youth Club Registration Form currently used by the Garden Club of New Jersey is included on page 15.

Each NGC state garden club is autonomous, and has it's own policies regarding youth club membership. Check with your state representative to see If there's an existing registration form. If not, here's an example of a form your club or state may wish to adopt.

HOW to fund an NGC Youth Club.

Each year, an **NGC-Affiliated Youth Garden Club** begins by creating a realistic budget in order to prepare appropriate fundraising strategies. Starting small in your first year is a good idea as the focus will be on fun and growing the club.

Funding is often a shared effort between the sponsoring club and the youth club. An **NGC-Affiliated Garden Club** willing to sponsor a youth club may choose to provide only the initial organizational funding or allocate an annual contribution from its budget.

A small annual dues requirement may be a funding option for some youth clubs and those operating within a school system may be eligible for financial support from the school's PTO/PTA.

More Funding Ideas!

Should your club need additional funding, approaching the corporate or small business communities may be the answer. A formal written request, which includes your youth club's annual budget, agenda and club photos, can increase the likelihood of approval. Here are just a few possibilities to get you started on the funding journey.

Annual NGC Youth Contests

NGC offers a variety of Youth Contests to encourage environmental responsibility and gardening skills in young people. These contests aim to foster a love for nature, conservation, and civic engagement.

Smokey Bear - Woodsy Owl Poster Contest

Sponsored by NGC & the US Forest Service, this annual drawing contest has students in grades 1-5 create posters featuring either the Smokey Bear or Woodsy Owl image to demonstrate their understanding of wildfire prevention and environmental conservation.

Youth Poetry Contest

A writing competition for students in kindergarten through 12th grade that aims to encourage and celebrate creativity and allows for various poetic forms.

Youth Recyclable Sculpture Contest

Encourages students in grades 4-8 to create sculptures using recycled, reused, and reduced materials. The goal is to inspire environmental awareness and creativity among young people.

Youth Participation in NGC Flower Shows & Floral Design Classes

NGC serves as the primary national organization for floral design education, exhibitions, and judging in the United States through its Flower Show School courses. These courses train and certify flower show judges and promote the art of floral design.

Although NGC currently does not offer specific floral design classes for youth, an interested NGC-affiliated Youth Club is encouraged to contact its state president for advice and guidance.

NGC Youth Club Checklist

Basic Requirements:

SPONSORED by an **NGC-Affiliated Garden Club**.

DESIGNATE a *Youth Club Leader* (by sponsoring club president.)

INTEREST in promoting youth gardening and environmental awareness by any club, organization, or group with adult leaders.

OPEN membership to youth from preschool through high school.

MAINTAIN a minimum of five youth members.

HOLD at least five meetings annually.

Sponsoring Club's Involvement

DETERMINES its own level of involvement beyond the Basic Requirements.

STRIVES to maintain close ties with the Youth Club during the year.

COMMITMENT LEVELS may include:

Individual member(s) **mentor** youth on a limited basis.

Entire club membership **meets** regularly with the YC.

The YC is **invited** to attend meetings & special events.

NGC Youth Club Checklist

Youth Club Leader (YCL) Responsibilities:

ESTABLISHES age ranges and groupings of members, with input from the sponsoring club.

EXPLORES and utilizes all available NGC resources, including the NGC website and *The National Gardener* quarterly publication.

DISTRIBUTES information about NGC Youth Contests, Awards, Scholarships, and Grants, including deadlines, upon release by NGC.

NOTIFIES members each spring of the winners of the annual NGC Contests, Awards, Scholarships, and Grants.

DETERMINES the activities, education, and programming for their club.

Youth Club Activity Guidelines:

MAKE meetings and activities FUN for all ages.

SEEK new gardening ideas and materials.

PRESENT gardening activities in a practical, hands-on way.

MAINTAIN an exciting, educational focus for youth members.

ENCOURAGE learning as a mutual process for both leaders and youth.
