Registration begins January 1, 2026, for Connecticut residents & January 15th for out-of-state students and consultants and is limited to a maximum of 80 participants.

Participation in one of two 15-minute Zoom practice sessions the week of March 17th is **required** in advance of the school to review required functions and check video and audio connections. Dates and times will be communicated via email.

Objectives of the Landscape Design School Courses

- Develop a greater sense of appreciation for private, public, and historical gardens
- Become better informed and promote positive changes in our surroundings
- Encourage beauty, utility, convenience, sound ecological practice, and ease of maintenance
- Achieve a better understanding of the landscape design process and promote landscapes that will sustain sound management
- Stimulate interest in all phases of landscape design, including community planning
- Develop a contingent of qualified Landscape Design Consultants to serve in decision-making areas of public life and provide leadership for educational programs, scholarships, and awards

Landscape Design School was developed by National Garden Clubs, Inc. in 1958 and has been offered by The Federated Garden Clubs of Connecticut, Inc. since 1978. The mission of this four-part course of study is “to educate garden club members and the public to know good landscape design practices and to serve as guardians and critics of the natural and man-made landscape.”

Anyone is welcome to attend (whether or not they are garden club members) who wishes to familiarize themselves with the principles, elements, and practices of landscape design.

- The curriculum is divided into four courses; one course is offered in Connecticut each year.
- Courses may be taken in any order.
- Students may take classes outside of Connecticut
- Students are encouraged to attend all four courses; however, each course stands alone.
- Landscape Architects and other professionals in the field present lectures.
- Students are urged to take the optional exam. Exams are multiple-choice, open-book, and taken online.

Landscape Design Consultants

Landscape Design Consultants (LDC) are needed to intelligently serve as members of park boards, highway and conservation commissions, school grounds committees, and other community organizations. The Landscape Design Council community collaborates with members of the landscape design professions to plan grounds for public buildings, parks, nature preserves, and roadsides.

Garden club members earn **NGC Landscape Design Consultant** status by:

- Attending all four courses and receiving a grade of 70 or better on the exams.
- Completing all four courses within seven years.

Landscape Design Council

Garden club members may join the Landscape Design Council as a provisional member after passing two courses. Council activities include field trips, programs, and other continuing education offerings.

Landscape Design Consultants are required to attend a course or refresher within five years of their last course to maintain their Landscape Design Consultant status (no exam required).
